Lack of Sanitation Consideration

-threw bottles at the stage

-runoff from the porta-potty system contaminated the clean drinking water

Poor Security

-lack of security at the barricade ("We're gonna need a bigger boat") -"Peace Patrol" kids with yellow t-shirts with lack of qualification -anyone could be recruited with a yellow shirt -lack of age verification (14-year-olds could attend) -staff was fired causing lack of bag searches -"Peace Wall" was knocked down and people broke in

Safety Concerns

-handed out candles -concert-goers start fires causing damage to vendor areas and destruction to the site (RHCP play FIRE) -ATMs were smashed and money was stolen

Sexual Assault

-4 women reported being raped/sexually assaulted

Producer Disorganization


-overly positive press interviews -CEO and producers weren't paying close attention to the issues


